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AMERICA NEEDS TO KEEP ITS PENSION PROMISE TO WORKERS

As noted on the IBT website - Teamsters and other Labor allies stood with Senator Bernie Sanders (I-Vt.) and Rep. Marcy Kaptur (D-Ohio) in Washington, DC to support new legislation that would protect the hard-earned pensions of workers and strengthen multi-employer pension plans.

Called the "Keep Our Pension Promises Act" the measure would:

...roll back provisions slipped into the fiscal 2015 spending bill approved by Congress last year that made earned pension benefits vulnerable to

cuts. The measure would restore anti-cutback rules so that recipients in financially troubled multi-employer pension plans will be protected from having their benefits cut.

The new legislation would also create a fund within the Pension Benefit Guarantee Corporation (PBGC) to help ensure retirees whose pension systems were abandoned by companies would continue to receive their earned benefits.

How will the government pay to cover these workers suffering the broken promise of a well-deserved retirement? By closing tax loopholes abused by some of the same corporate forces and wealthy elites looting workers' pensions across America.

As Teamsters General President James P. Hoffa said, retirees and workers who have played by the rules should receive the benefits they were promised. The Teamsters thank Senator Sanders and Representative Kaptur for taking steps to ensure the government repairs some of the damage done by big banks to these retirement plans.

Teamsters Vice President John Murphy also spoke at the press conference where the bill sponsored by Sanders and Kaptur was unveiled:

Government actions like deregulation, bad trade deals and bailing out the big banks have all played a role in the pension crisis. The solutions to the problem should not rest on workers who have worked hard for their pensions.

Frank Bryant, a retired UPS Teamster driver of 31 years also attended this event. Bryant is 74 years old and is worried about his pension. He and others see the "Keep Our Pension Promises Act" as an important response to Congress's shameless betrayal of 1.5 million retirees whose troubled multi-employer plans are now open to severe cuts of 30 percent or more.

Our country made a commitment to hardworking Americans and that commitment needs to be met. We can't allow Wall Street to plunder workers' retirements security and government to renege on its promises to the men and women who make our economy run.

It's about time Congress shows the same level of concern for workers' lives on the job and in retirement as it shows for corporate welfare.

Brothers and sisters, as you know living in Minnesota during the winter months can be trying at times.

But when the summer months roll around it allows us to reflect on why we call Minnesota home. Our summers provide so many opportunities for outdoor activities

with our families and friends, and really allow us to explore Minnesota at its finest!

While your summer journeys take you to one of our many wonderful lakes, or put you on a hike on our numerous fantastic trails across our state, politics is still alive and in full conversation.

This summer will be no different than any others that include discussions with elected officials regarding our next legislative session. If you have an opportunity to engage into conversation with elected officials, please do so and ask them how they stand on issues that impact your job.

I am listing a few issues that are near and dear to our hearts, but especially to members that it will positively impact if you are in the trucking or school bus driving industries. Even if you are not employed in either of these fields, it's about unity, and your conversation with your legislator would support one of your brothers or sisters who is! Understand that these aren't by far the only issues that will be worked on this next session, but are some of the many in a long list of priorities.

School Bus Drivers

There is a bill in the Minnesota state legislature that would change the way unemployment benefits are provided for school bus drivers. Unfortunately we are only one of 12 states that exempt school bus drivers from collecting unemployment benefits during the summer months. WE NEED TO CHANGE THAT! The reality is that there are many other industries that do provide

unemployment benefits for seasonal employees, so there really isn't a viable reason that a school bus driver should be excluded. Our members in this industry have families that are reliant on their wages and benefits year round including summer months, and it is unconscionable if legislators don't do something to change this.

Please ask your Minnesota legislator to support HF 2341 (Hilstrom) and SF 2173 (Johnson). These two pro-Union and pro working families' legislators have stepped up and will fight tooth and nail to help our members out on this issue. Your help will support them along the way!

Independent Contractors

In 2005 Teamsters Joint Council 32 DRIVE embarked on changing the Minnesota IC (Independent Contractor) guidelines in the Trucking Industry.

After a few bills were vetoed by anti-Union Governor Pawlenty, we were finally successful in 2007 in changing the criteria on what defined an IC in the Trucking Industry.

Unfortunately as soon as it was passed, many of these employers went to work to find loopholes on how to finagle the system, and they have. IC's do not receive any company benefits, unemployment benefits or workers compensation benefits and must report their wages on a IRS form1099. The logic is that they are owners of their own company, but not in our opinion.

Many IC's in the Trucking Industry work solely for one company and are required to sign an "exclusivity contract" which prohibits them from working for any other company. Many are required to wear a uniform and drive a truck with a company name and logo plastered prominently, yet it's the name of the shipper, not the company they supposedly own. Many are also required to leave their truck domiciled at the shipper's base, and in some cases are reprimanded if they don't perform to company standards. I'm not exactly sure where the "independence" logic comes into play, but

nonetheless the current statute allows for it.

The reality is that these scrupulous shipping companies have created an unfair competitive advantage in the industry, and this must be stopped! This model also short changes our unemployment and workers compensation coffers, which in turn hurts all workers.

If you're in the Trucking Industry, your call should be a no brainer. But even if you're not, unfortunately this sham Independent Contractor model seems to be gravitating into other industries such as the Bread Industry which falls under the same statute.

Please ask your Minnesota legislator to support HF 2250 (Johnson, S) and the Senator Tomassoni's bill (doesn't have a number yet), to provide a level playing field in the Trucking Industry. Your calls and conversations are critically important!

Political Action Team - DRIVE

Finally, if you haven't taken the time to register for our Political Action Team on our website, please do so. It is very important when you register to provide all of the information requested, especially your cellular number and wireless provider. This gives us an opportunity to contact you via text when a potential political issue arises that could impact your job. Register at teamstersjc32. org under the "Political Action Team" icon.

Also, during these next few months, there will be various DRIVE solicitation programs at many of our worksites. If you're already part of the DRIVE program we are asking that your fill out another card to help us update our system. If you're not signed up, please help us in this effort by contributing a payroll deduction \$1.00 a week for Teamster political power! DRIVE gives us the ability to elect allies in the legislature and show our foes the door!

LOCAL 90 PROTECTING PENSION FUNDS

At our May Membership meeting, we had a long discussion about the status of the Central States Pension Fund and the task of preparing a Rescue Plan to be submitted by the Fund Trustees to the Department of Treasury.

We encouraged our membership to ask potential presidential candidates where they stand on protecting earned pension benefits and assisting financially troubled multi-employer pension plans, an issue very much on the minds of Teamster members.

I was pleased to read a message from our General President James P. Hoffa, that Senator Bernie Sanders and Representative Marcy Kaptur last month introduced legislation that would restore anticutback rules that were slipped into the fiscal 2015 spending bill, so the pension benefits of current pensioners would be protected from having their benefits cut. Also included in the bill was the creation of a legacy fund, within the Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation (PBGC), to help ensure participants whose companies have abandoned the pension system

would continue to receive the benefits they earned. The money to cover these retirees and workers would be covered by closing tax loopholes used by the very wealthy.

The bill is being called "Keep Our Pension Promises Act." We need to do our part and press Congress to remember hardworking Americans deserve what's coming to them.

Arbitration

We are also heading to arbitration with Bimbo Baking following their decision to allow the (scab) independent operators to distribute the Natures Harvest product line.

THE CHANGING NATURE OF ASSISTANCE

Since the late 1980's the Minnesota Teamsters Service Bureau has been actively involved in helping Teamsters, their families, and working people laid off from their jobs. Starting with Teamsters and laid off Teamster drivers, our services have grown to address needs of workers from all walks of life, throughout Joint Council 32. These services are supported by Local Unions at no cost and are confidential to members and their families.

Ask Cindy Whelan, Family Services Specialist at the Minnesota Teamsters Service Bureau, what are some of the key areas in which Teamsters request assistance?

•Family and Relationship Counseling - Our Employee Assistance Program is 24/7

when family issues arise.

•Financial Problems - loss of income creates managing finances difficult. A need for direction on what to do next.

•Alcohol and Chemical Dependency -We've seen an uptick this summer, but often get referrals when ACD issues are large enough to lead to discharge from employment.

·Legal Consultation - Wills, DUIs, Custody and Divorce.

Our changing workplace continues to present new needs. For example, assistance is needed with language barriers.

Some Teamster clients are unable to read or understand English and may require

interpretation to communicate workplace needs. The Service Bureau currently has two employees who are bilingual in Spanish and English, but there is an increasing range of interpreting needs.

We recently began working with laid off Teamster members from Gedney Foods, many whose primary language is not English. An initial orientation required interpreters of seven different languages, with follow-up meetings scheduled for the clients including counselors and interpreters.

As we prepare for tomorrow's workforce, the Service Bureau needs to be language accessible and ready for the changing nature of assistance required from us.

UNIONS DO WORKER TRAINING BETTER

The International Brotherhood of Teamsters writes extensively about the importance of unions in American life -- how unions provide a pathway to the middle class by paying \$200 a week more than non-union jobs as well as offering good health care and other benefits.

One thing that is often overlooked, however, is how Unions provide skilled workers to American companies. For decades, trained labor professionals have taken up important roles in many different sectors of society. The Teamsters, for example, have been at the forefront of providing qualified truckers to businesses so they can safety transport cargo along the highways of this nation.

But increasingly, the corporate class has taken the cheap way out. And they are paying the price for that, as a Washington Post story states:

Although it has historically constructed highquality educational pipelines to well-paying jobs in cooperation with employers, Labor has lost ground over the years. In the absence of Union training programs, businesses in vast sectors of the economy are scrambling to meet their workforce needs through other means, like piecemeal job training programs and partnerships with community colleges, with few solutions that have really broad reach.

Some have attempted to go around the Union model and form apprenticeships. But as the article states, in many cases that can "lead to a proliferation of low-quality programs." Imitators often can't provide the same skills that Unions have

The Teamsters haven't stopped trying to improve the skills of hardworking Americans. In fact, it is a integral part of our core mission. Earlier this year, the Union announced it was teaming with the U.S. Army and ABF Freight to provide commercial driver's license (CDL) training to veterans transitioning to civilian life. It's just the latest effort of the Teamster Military Assistance Program.

In addressing the first graduating class of drivers at Fort Sill, Oklahoma in March, Teamsters General President Jim Hoffa said the Union was providing a service that he hoped would be expanded:

"The men and women who defend and protect our country deserve good, full-time jobs when they return home. I am proud that our Union is working in this great partnership to honor our military veterans and help them transition to a rewarding civilian career." If America wants to compete in an increasingly global economy, it needs to do more to succeed. Better worker training means better services and safety for all Americans. Labor Unions like the Teamsters make it happen every day.

A college degree is not the answer for all workers. It should be the goal of lawmakers across the political spectrum to encourage youth not pursuing post-secondary academic studies to obtain training in a skill area that will provide them with the opportunity to earn a living wage and give them a career track that will ultimately give them a foothold in the middle class.

Increasing worker training, particularly through Labor Unions like the Teamsters, will ensure that will happen. That's good for workers and good for America.
